Highland Events Rogaine Heaven, Wanaka, Saturday 23rd October (Labor Weekend), 12 & 6hr.

Australian Rogaining Championships

22 to 23 January 2011. This 24 hour rogaine is hosted by Rogaining Tasmania in the northern midlands of Tasmania. The course will be set by experienced rogainers John Brock, Darryl Smith, Karen Pedley and Nigel Davies. The terrain will be a mixture of open plains (farmland) and steeper lightly wooded hills. See the event website, <u>http://www.arc2011.rt.asn.au/</u>. This is likely to be a qualifying event for the 10th World Championships in the Czech Republic.

IRF Budget process

Rogaining relies on financial resources to deliver events for its members and for promotion and growth of rogaining globally. The sport has a responsibility to ensure that its funds are used legally, wisely and effectively. Sources of funding include:

- donors and granting agencies
- members' event fees
- members' capitation fees
- government grants
- co-funding of initiatives with various rogaining, and other, associations.

Some goals:

- Link the budget process directly to the Strategic Plan for Rogaining.
- Provide excellent reporting and transparency on financial activities.
- Achieve an appropriate balance between event fees, capitation fees, and other fund sources [*by*: consulting with Members].
- Ensure grants lead to strengthening of the sport [*by*: seeking alignment

with the operational mission (in Part B), delivering on conditions attached to grants].

- Use funds held by rogaining associations effectively [*by*: reviewing use of longer-term funds in each annual budget process].

World Rogaining Championships – current discusions

The World Rogaining Championships have reached the stage where there are more potential participants than the maximum comfortable number for environmental reasons (suggested as 500-800).

There are several options that are available to rogaining to address this situation such as to increase the area of each event, select areas that can accommodate many more entrants, accept that there may be well-marked tracks leading in towards many controls, have separate events run simultaneously on the one course but with different controls, or limit numbers to 500-800.

If numbers are limited then the challenge becomes how to prioritise the various entrants including the outright elite, leading volunteers, sporting administration leaders, or representatives of various countries and gender and age groups. It is widely agreed that the rogaining tourist should have lower priority than those who compete regularly or contribute to the running of the sport, i.e. a rogainer tourist being one who enters a world championship but is rarely seen in the sport before or after that event; a requirement might be to have competed previously in one national 24 hour championship.

We have further options available that include organising a WRC every year, or having a rogaining world cup format in alternate years to the WRC. These ideas are all open for discussion.
